

The CHWC Scholarship Committee is pleased to share the names of the 2023 scholarship winners from Citrus and

Lecanto High Schools, as well as some information about who they are and their plans for next year. We were so happy to be able to introduce these young scholars to the membership at our May 10<sup>th</sup> Luncheon, so that you could see for yourselves the enormous strength and motivation these young people have.

We looked at academic achievement, leadership, and community service as the basis for our choices, as well as financial need and personal circumstances. Several of these students have unique personal stories that make them deserving of our recognition and support. We are proud to be able to award these 16 students a scholarship of \$1,500 each to help them begin their college studies. This amount represents a \$500 increase from previous years, made possible by the hard work, organization, participation, and generosity of the women in our Club, our President, Cheryl Ringel, and our Board of Directors.

We wish each one of the students the best of luck as they begin their journeys into adult-hood and feel confident that this accomplished group will make us proud as they pursue their dreams at the college of their choice. 



In addition to being an excellent athlete, Constantine was a member of LHS Academic Team, and was President of Youth in Government his senior year. He managed to accomplish all of this while also holding a part-time job throughout high school! One of his teachers described him as "a talented and inspirational young man who is a true servant-leader. The growth I have witnessed Constantine make over the years I have known him has been inspiring. He is a consistent friend to those around him, dedicated and loyal to those who rely on him."

served as Captain, participated in student government, Key Club and was an IB student as well as an AP Scholar, she also managed to earn her pilot's license in April 2023! Shelby will be attending the University of Central Florida in the fall and plans on majoring in aeronautical engineering. Right now, she is thinking about creating new flight simulators and possibly designing a new aircraft. One of the school counselors wrote the following: "Shelby was captain of an exceptional girls' varsity basketball team this year. She demonstrated leadership, sportsmanship and is a role model for younger players on and off the court." Her youth pastor agrees and says, "she possesses a strength of character and a contagious positive attitude."



Kelie Shah (LHS) Kelie's route to success as a student was a bit more difficult than most, as she came to the US from India in 2016 and had to adjust to a new culture, a new environment and a different school system, more than once. This did not stop her from pursu-

ing difficult AP and IB courses, and she now ranks in the top 5% of her graduating class. Kelie was a member of Key Club, HOSA, National Honor So-





ciety, Medicine Share, Environmental Club and Spanish Club. She also volunteered over 300 hours at Citrus Pulmonary and Citrus Memorial. Her counselor said, "Kelie is one of those students that all you need to do is ask and she will be off and running to make it happen. She is involved, hard-working and passionate." Kelie will continue her education next fall at the University of South Florida as a Biology ma-





Kimberly Valente (LHS) Kimberly is an accomplished artist who has an eye for fashion and style. She has chosen to begin her education after high school at the Withlacoochee Technical College as a cosmetology major. An AP Art student, a member of both the National Honor Society and the National Art Honors Society, as well as a stu-

dent in the Lecanto School of Arts, a member of Chorus and the Tri-M Music Honors Society, Kimberly is described as "an excellent independent worker who takes initiative and is self-driven when working to complete a task." One of her teachers adds, "Kimberly stands out among her peers as woman who will succeed with immense drive, determination, skill, and creativity. She possesses great character with the ability to look beyond consider the greater good."





Bella Arnold (CHS) Bella is one of those few truly amazing students who will graduate this year with both a high school diploma and an Associate of Arts Degree from the College of Central Florida based on her successful dual enrollment status. Consequently, she was able to transfer to the school of her



choice to complete her undergraduate studies, the University of South Florida, majoring in political science with plans to follow up with a law degree and a career

as a civil rights lawyer. Additionally, Bella has worked close to full time hours for the past three years, been a Varsity Softball player and earned over 150 community service hours. One of Bella's teachers says, "Her amazing work ethic is only shadowed by her intelligence., and she truly cares about learning, not just achieving a grade." Her employer wrote to us, saying, "She embodies autonomous leadership qualities, resiliency in managing conflict, and timeliness in executing any given task."







Lucia Dillersberger (CHS) Lucia is an AP Scholar who has already earned 21 college credits through the Dual Enrollment program, and she will be continuing her education next fall at the University of West Florida as an Environmental Science major. One of Lucia 's teachers told us: "Lucia was one of the most capable, responsible, and actively involved students in the classroom, never satisfied with a passive experience. She even became a certified open water scuba diver to prepare herself for a potential





career in the environmental sciences...always seeking opportunities to improve herself." Sticking with her passion, Lucia has participated in the Citrus Regional Science and Engineering Fair since the fifth grade, the State Science and Engineering Fair of Florida since the 7<sup>th</sup> grade, the National Ocean Sciences Bowl, Save Our Waters Week Environmental Jeopardy, and Save Earth's Environment Through Knowledge (SEEK), among many other activities.









## Darla Edwards (CHS)

Darla, a first-generation college student, is graduating #10 in her class, and headed to Florida State University with the clear goal of becoming a nurse. She is an AP Scholar who has taken some of the most challenging Advanced Placement courses offered, a champion Girls Weightlifter, and a Varsity cheerleader who



has demonstrated clear leadership during her years at CHS. Darla participated in many community service activities and was the Treasurer for the National Honor Society as well as for Helping Hands. She was also one of only seven students in Citrus County history to have acquired her AP Capstone Diploma in her junior year. One of her teachers told us, "Darla does not let anything get in the way of success. But what sets her apart from other driven students is that she is pragmatic even with lofty goals. She understands that there are ups and downs, but to stay focused on the end result."



McKenna Heaton (CHS) McKenna, a strong student headed to Florida State University to double major in economics and political science, has made an outstanding impression on many people at CHS. One of her teachers told us: "More important than her stellar GPA and long list of

extracurriculars is that McKenna is a positive force at Citrus High School. She is quick to help any of her peers in need. She builds people up and leaves her friends and teachers smiling. I have never heard her utter an unkind word. McKenna is truly a student exemplar." A multi-talented young woman, McKenna has participated in various musical groups, such as Tri-M, Breez, and Chamber Choir, she has been a Varsity Tennis player for four years, Secretary and Vice President of Helping Hands, and a LINK leader. We are confident that she will represent us well!



## **Laci Hindalong (CHS)**

Laci will be attending the University of South Florida with a dual major in Biology and Criminology. She aspires to become a crime scene investigator. As a champion member of the Girls Weightlifting Team, she has been a two-time district winner and state

qualifier who received the *Ultimate Warrior Award* after earning a spot in the state weightlifting meet last





year. This is in addition to her ranking #6 in her graduating class at CHS, earning her A.S. degree from the College of Central Florida while still in high school and graduating as an AP Scholar! One of her teachers told us that "Laci is one of the strongest young women I have worked with in nearly 3 decades of teaching. She is an example to others in loyalty and compassion and is someone that respects the ideas of others while still staying true to her own convictions."







Evan Scott Jones (CHS) Evan is a young man with varied interests, ranging from baseball and weightlifting to computer science and engineering. When he graduates from CHS in May, he will not only have a high school diploma, but 25 credits from the College of Central Florida. He plans to attend CCF next year pursuing a degree in Exer-

cise Science before transferring to the University of Central Florida for his B.S. with a major in Business and a minor in Engineering. Evan has been a member of the Academy of Computer Science and is graduating with certifications in HTML, CSS, and Microsoft Office. He has also worked a part-time job for the past two years and volunteered with the Inverness Little League as an umpire and the Citrus County Education Foundation, where he has assisted in their teacher store. One of Evan's teachers told us: "He is a trustworthy, reliable, good-humored, incredibly hard-working young man who supports others in and out of the classroom."



Aubrey Mueller (CHS) Aubrey will pursue her college education at Florida State University, majoring in Biomedical Engineering. She has been a dedicated athlete during high school, participating in Soccer, Cross Country, (Captain) and Track & Field (Captain) for four years as well as spend-

Club, president of the Interact Club and Secretary of Helping Hands. Aubrey was also a CHS student representative to the Citrus County Blessings Board. One of Aubrey's coaches described her as "a young woman who is looked to for her leadership on and off the field. She understands the value of goal setting and the importance of teamwork. She has shown the ability to bounce back from adversity and is willing to put in extra time to improve on weaknesses. She realizes that success can only be obtained through hard work and a positive attitude."





Keirstin Perkins (CHS) Keirstin will be graduating #7 in her class and is heading to Gainesville to attend the University of Florida and major in Finance. She is also an AP Scholar, is a member of the Computer Science Academy, is a part of the AP Capstone program and the unique Nature Coast Investment Program. She will graduate with 27 credit hours from her work in the Dual Enrollment program. She has also held a part-time job and worked 15-20 hours for the past two years. Her employer

told us: "I am continually impressed with her commitment and work ethic. She is always one to take initiative and complete all assigned tasks in a timely manner. I have never had someone work for me who was such a hard worker but also such a pleasure to work around." One of her teachers wrote: "Very few high school seniors have the combination of academic excellence, integrity, determination, motivation and real-work experience that Keirstin possesses."



Emma Seal (CHS) Emma has left her mark on CHS with her energy, intelligence, creativity, and motivation. She is the founder and President of two new clubs, the Sewing Club, a hobby and community service organization, as well as the

Geometry Club, which helps to guide and tutor students through geometry coursework. She is also an athlete, playing Flag Football and Volleyball for four years, serving as team Captain for both. Emma is the Vice-President of the National Honor Society and the Media



Manager of Citrus Crazies, running the social media page to encourage students to attend school and sporting events. "Emma is talented, caring, intuitive, dedicated and focused on her pursuits. She exudes a unique sense of maturity and has the ability to inspire those around her," one of her teachers told us. Emma will be attending the University of Central Florida in the fall, majoring in Political Science, and hopes to pursue a law degree after that, with a focus on Elder Law.









Chase Watkins (CHS) Chase is an AP Scholar who loves history. He has taken a number of AP courses, scored extremely well on all AP exams and is also a member of the Capstone Research course. Chase has participated in both English and Math tutoring, and said, "I enjoyed offering my assistance and was able to feel what the teachers have to go through." He has also done work for Citrus County Blessings, the Drama Department, Citrus County Stuff the Bus, and Letters Against Isolation, an organization that formed during Covid to combat





## Fly Like an Eagle—Zip Lining





Jongg classes.






