### **President's Message**

Although there were no April showers, **it was a very busy month for CHWC.** Our **Spring Golf Tournament** wrapped up our **last fundraising event of the club year**. Representatives from our supported charities joined us for lunch at our April meeting, and shared their words of gratitude as they received our donation. In addition, **a special program was held to recognize our many members who volunteered throughout the year**. Finally, I presented our **Annual Report to the membership**. For those who were unable to attend the meeting, highlights of the Club's 2022-2023 membership year are below.

#### **Milestone Year**

This year has been a significant transitional milestone year for the club. CHWC was officially recognized by the IRS as a <u>501(c)(3) charitable organization</u> in late July 2022. This prestigious status opened up many benefits to our organization, such as many tax benefits that exempt us from certain taxes and also allows our donors to claim a tax deduction. It **opened up an expansive network of donors that we can tap into and enabled us to increase our charitable fundraising and scholarship goals this year**. In fact, this year, we exceeded our goal of \$30K by **\$20K**!, we embarked on various initiatives **targeted toward marketing, operational, and cost savings:**

#### Marketing Initiatives

- **Modernized our organization's website** to serve as a helpful and informative tool for our members and visiting public. The site provides up-todate information at your fingertips – anywhere, anytime.
- Appealing to our diverse group of members, we debuted for the first time the "Let's Give It A Try" small group activities, offering a versatile assortment of fun things to do, while also adding some different flavors to our typical bus trip activities.
- Expanded **club publicity efforts on several fronts**, including the Facebook publications and additional newspaper coverage (i.e. the Chronicle sponsored us through providing free advertising space).
- Established a relationship with potential national sponsors such as: Combined Federal Campaign, Amazon's Benevity Charitable Manager Services Fortune 100 companies (e.g. Coke, Google, Microsoft, Samsung, Starbucks), and Versaic.com Charitable Manager Services Sporting Companies such as Dicks Sporting Goods and Golf Galaxy.
- Developed a **marketing Tri-Fold brochure representative** of what the CHWC Organization is about to provide prospective sponsors and donors.

#### **Operational Initiatives**

- Standardized and Centralized key forms and letters. Updates were made to several of our forms and letters, such as donor letters, donor receipts, and key tracking forms to meet the requirements as a <u>501(c)(3) charitable</u> <u>organization</u>.
- Innovated our raffle ticket system which saved time and ticket purchasing cost.
- Developed a "Donor Tracking System" to serve as an IRS record, as well as a helpful tool for us to know what donors were approached and when.

#### **Charitable Projects**

The Club collected Charitable Donations through varied approaches:

- Three public drive-thru collections were held at the Lutheran Church parking lot July, November, and March seeking donations of needed items for CASA, the Resource Center, and Paw Pantry. These events, advertised to the public through the news media, proved to be extremely successful.
- At our monthly luncheons, members generously donated needed items for CASA, the Resource Center, Head Start, and Paw Pantry.
- **"Operation Keep Citrus Warm"** was held in November. A plethora of blankets, coats, jackets, sweatshirts, hoodies, sweaters, hats, gloves, socks and children's clothes were collected and given to **Daystar for distribution** to families in dire need and many with limited to no heat.
- CHWC supported the distribution of Bombas socks to many local groups in great need.
- Our members generously supported the Citrus County Resource Center sponsored "Adopt-A-Child" for Christmas project, giving so many children the joy of Christmas.

#### **Charitable Fundraisers**

We've experienced **a very profitable year with our fundraising efforts.** Making use of our new status, we began to tap into company sponsorships such as **Tito's and Google,** and began laying the groundwork for future partnerships. We've only just begun!

April will wrap-up our eighth and final event. Events included:

#### **Fundraising Summary**

The board approved \$40,000 this year for allocation to charities and scholarships listed below. This year, we were able to increase our high school student scholarship amounts from **\$1,000 to \$1,500**; funds were allocated as follows:

- \$24,000 to 16 local high school student scholarships
- \$16,000 to eight local charities Carter Head Start School, CASA of Citrus County, Citrus County Blessings, Citrus County Family Resource Center, Community Food Bank of Citrus County), Jesse's Place, Voices for Children (Citrus County only), and Meals on Wheels PetMeals.
- Additional funds available from our April fundraiser will be targeted for scholarships to College of Central Florida and Withlacoochee Technical College and charities.

The 2022-2023 year serves as a milestone year in the club's 37-year history, and has paved the way for our future years' endeavors and continued successes. I'll part with one of my favorite quotes:

# **Scholarship News**



At the April 3 meeting of the **CHWC Board of Directors**, a vote was taken to approve the recommendation of our **Finance Advisory Committee to award a total of 16 high school scholarships this year, as recommended by the Scholarship Committee on March 30**<sup>th</sup>.

We are overjoyed to be able to have six winners from Lecanto High School and ten winners from Citrus High School, each of whom will receive the amount of \$1,500 to go to the college or university of their choice. Our attention will turn to college scholarships for students attending Withlacoochee Technical College and the College of Central Florida once all fundraising activities have been completed for this year.

Our applicants this year were remarkable in many ways. **Eight of our winners** ranked in the top 3% or better of their class, several of the students from both schools are AP Scholars, and four of the Lecanto winners are scheduled to receive the prestigious International Baccalaureate Diploma. Additionally, two of our scholarship recipients have worked so diligently in the Dual Enrollment program with the College of Central Florida that they are graduating this year not only with their high school diplomas, but with their Associate of Arts (A.A.) degree as well, a truly laudable accomplishment! As a group, they represent the high schools' best scholars, outstanding athletes, school leaders and contributors to the well-being of our community.

This senior class has had a high school experience somewhat different from the one most of us and our children had. Many of the experiences and opportunities one associates with high school were diminished or lost to them during the pandemic and its aftermath. But nevertheless, we were able to pick a strong, accomplished group of young people who we believe has the potential to be successful in future academic studies. Each of them has a personal story, ambition, creativity, and all have an admirable work ethic, noted by teachers, coaches, employers, and ministers alike. We also looked at demonstrated financial need as we made our decisions and found this group to have a strong desire to be self-reliant, selfsupporting, and debt-free upon completion of their studies.

This years' scholarship winners will be introduced to you at the May 10<sup>th</sup> Luncheon and in the June Newsletter. Please come! Meeting these young people will surely put a smile on your face and make you feel proud of the work you have done and the support you have given to support the scholarship efforts of the Citrus Hills Women's Club.

# Citrus Hills Women's Club Supports Local Charities
