Work will continue to complete remaining updates as necessary.

CHWC Crafters for November Luncheon Meeting



program received a donation of 370 pounds of dog and cat food from this drive-thru. An SUV full of items donated to CASA was delivered to them.

CHWC Paw Pantry......Helping Senior's Pets



On July 27th, CHWC invited members, as well as the community to participate in a **Drive Thru collection** of items to be donated to three local charities. It was a huge success! **CHWC**Paw Pantry collected 290 pounds of dog food as well as 80 pounds of cat food, for a grand total of 370 pounds donated to Pet Meals.

The Citrus County Pet Meals Program is supplemental to Meals on Wheels. Pet Meals started nearly 19 years ago when a very thin man receiving Meals on Wheels was only taking small bites of his food and then placing his food tray on the floor for a much beloved Chihuahua to finish his meal. When asked why he was doing this, he stated he did not have the money to buy dog food any longer and that he would rather go hungry than not feed his pet. Pet Meals is 100 percent donation-based and volunteer driven program that provides dog/cat food to about 100 home bound seniors.



Student needs include basic supplies such as:


- Pencils

We are very pleased to report that the fundraising efforts of our generous and hardworking members for the 2021-2022 club season were remarkably fruitful, and enabled the Citrus Hills Women's Club to have a most successful scholarship year. At our May luncheon, we awarded 15 scholarships of \$1000 each to deserving students from Citrus Hills and Lecanto High Schools. Additionally, we were able to send \$2,000 to the College of Central Florida and \$2,500 to the Withlacoochee Technical College. These schools will pick the scholarship winners from their pool of applicants and the funds will be awarded during the fall semester and be used to pay 2023 college bills. As hard as this group of students has worked, they will have to seek help from outside their family with questions about how to choose a major, live in a dorm, what courses to take and how to manage their time, but also have to figure a lot out for themselves, like managing expenses.

They might not anticipate yearly tuition raises or how to fill the gaps once freshman scholarship awards are gone. Many of their college friends will get allowances from their parents while they will have to find part time jobs to pay for personal expenses. Many will simply have to work harder than their peers.

Dr. Charles Martinez, Dean of the School of Education at the University of Austin, himself a first-generation student, believes in this group and their ability to succeed. He said the following: "If you are a first-generation student, I say you are not attending college by accident. You are not an exception to a rule. You have earned this opportunity through your hard work." We on the CHWC Scholarship Committee, as representatives of all of you, are proud to have given our support this year to several first-generation college freshmen. We are confident that they will be among the group that graduates with a four-year degree and enters the work force to help strengthen and support their families and their communities.

We have **received several thank you letters**, both from the high school and college leadership and the students themselves. The adults who work with these young people expressed their sincere gratitude for the work we do and the support we provide their students. We have also received several thank you notes from the students who were recipients of our scholarships in the spring of 2022. We were delighted to hear from each and every student. (An interesting note: Almost all commented on how much they loved the food at the luncheon!!) Below are representative excerpts from a few of the notes we received:
